Children recognise their own right to be protected from the inappropriate use of technology by others and their responsibility to report concerns. Children understand how to use social networking websites appropriately, keeping an adult informed about their online activity. They make good choices when they present themselves online.

Children recognise the appropriate online tools to collaborate and communicate with others, understanding how to protect themselves from online bullying or causing hurt to others, especially when using social networks (including online gaming communities). Children understand the need to respect the rights of other users, and understand their own responsibility for information that is shared and how it may impact on others.
